1. The last order under Section 51 of the Local Government Act 1972 in relation to the electoral arrangements for districts in the County of Cambridgeshire was made on 3 September 1980. As required by Section 63 and Schedule 9 of the Act we have now reviewed the electoral arrangements for that county using the procedure we had set out in our Report No 6.
2. We informed Cambridgeshire County Council in a consultation letter dated 29 May 1981 that we proposed to conduct the review and sent copies of the letter to all local authorities and parish meetings in the county, to the MPs representing the constituencies concerned, to the headquarters of the main political parties and to the editors both of local newspapers circulating in the county and of the local government press. Notices in the local press announced the start of the review and invited comments from members of the public and from interested bodies.
3. On 6 November 1981 the County Council submitted to us a draft scheme which they had published based on 75 electoral divisions for the county each returning one member in accordance with section 6(2)(a) of the Act. The County Council informed us that they wished to amend the draft scheme in the light of comments they had received on it to provide a more even standard of representation. This would result in a council of 77 members, the districts of Huntingdon and South Cambridgeshire each receiving one extra member. The County Council also wished to amend the draft scheme in respect of four electoral divisions in the City of Cambridge. We asked the County Council to advertise the revised draft scheme, with a brief explanation of how it differed from the previously published version.
4. On 3 September 1982 the County Council submitted to us a revised draft scheme in which they suggested 77 electoral divisions each returning one member in accordance with section 6(2)(a) of the Act.

5. We considered this scheme together with the views expressed on it. On 11 March 1983 we issued draft proposals which we sent to all those who had received our consultation letter or commented on the County Council's draft scheme. Notices were inserted in the local press announcing that the draft proposals had been issued and could be inspected at the County Council's offices.

6. We incorporated the County Council's revised draft scheme in our draft proposals subject to the following amendments which we adopted to achieve the best possible standard of representation and to take account of comments which we had received:

(a) Cambridge City

The change of name of the Queen Edith division to Queen Edith's.

(b) East Cambridgeshire District

An alternative scheme for the district suggested by Peterborough Constituency Labour Party.

(c) Fenland District

The re-arrangement of the Elm, North Witchford and Whittlesey Rural and Whittlesey divisions suggested by Peterborough Constituency Labour Party.

(d) Huntingdon District

The replacement of the St Ives North, St Ives South and Somersham divisions with an alternative arrangement of three divisions suggested by County Councillor J A P Eddy.

(e) Peterborough City

An alternative scheme for the district suggested by Peterborough Constituency Labour Party.

7. We received comments in response to our draft proposals from the County Council, four district councils, 25 parish or town councils, six political organisations, one county councillor, one district councillor, one town councillor and 17 private individuals. A list of those who wrote to us is given in Appendix 1 to this report.

8. The comments we received can be summarised as follows:-

(a) Cambridge City

The County Council and Cambridgeshire County Labour Party supported the draft proposals.

(b) East Cambridgeshire

The County Council objected to the draft proposals and submitted an alternative scheme. They considered that although the draft proposals achieved a reasonable electoral balance they were illogical and formed no basis for a scheme of county divisions. They were of the opinion that the proposals undermined established community links and interests and brought together parishes with no natural or community associations. The County Council based their alternative scheme on school catchment areas which they considered were a vital link in rural communities. They claimed that the scheme built onto the natural grouping of parishes and produced the best arrangement for the provision of effective and convenient representation. East Cambridgeshire District Council objected to the draft proposals and supported the County Council's alternative scheme. South East Cambridgeshire Liberal Association objected to the draft proposals for the Burwell, Ely South and Swaffham and Woodditton divisions and supported the Burwell division in the County Council's alternative scheme. Lode Parish Council, Swaffham Bulbeck Parish Council, Bottisham Parish Council, Stretham Parish Council, Burwell Parish Council, Little Thetford Parish Council, District Councillor H J L Fitch and 15 private individuals objected to the draft proposals on the grounds of lack of community interests. Cambridgeshire County Labour Party supported the draft proposals and objected to

the County Council's alternative scheme. They considered that the majority of divisions in the alternative scheme were too large and that one division was too small. Bretton Branch Labour Party supported the draft proposals.

(c) Fenland

The County Council supported six of the divisions in the draft proposals but submitted an alternative scheme for the Elm, North Witchford and Whittlesey Rural and Whittlesey divisions. Fenland District Council submitted an alternative scheme for three divisions which was the same as that prepared by the County Council. Cambridgeshire County Labour Party supported the draft proposals and objected to the alternative scheme for three division prepared by the County Council. They considered that the draft proposals were, on balance, the best for Whittlesey and the whole district. Bretton Branch Labour Party supported the draft proposals. Doddington Parish Council objected to the draft proposals as they affected their parish and submitted an alternative scheme affecting three divisions. Manea Parish Council supported Doddington Parish Council's suggestion. Wimblington Parish Council objected to the draft proposals as they affected their parish and considered it would be better to link their village with either Chatteris or March.

(d) Huntingdon

The County Council, Cambridgeshire County Council Labour Party, Somersham Parish Council, Oldhurst Parish Council and Colne Parish Council supported the draft proposals. Huntingdon District Council supported the draft proposals but suggested that the St Ives and Warboys divisions be renamed 'St Ives South' and 'St Ives North and Warboys' respectively because the Warboys division contains a substantial part of the electorate of St Ives and it would be appropriate for a reference to the Town to be included in the name. Town Councillor M Plews and St Ives Town Council objected to the draft proposals and submitted an alternative scheme for four divisions. St Ives Town Council subsequently informed us that they had considered the reactions of parishes surrounding St Ives who would be affected by any changes to county electoral boundaries and decided that the best solution would be for St Ives to remain as one division although development in the town would, in due course, warrant

St Ives having two divisions. Fenstanton Parish Council, Hilton Parish Council and Holywell-cum-Needingworth Parish Council supported the draft proposals and objected to the alternative scheme submitted by St Ives Town Council. St Neots Town Council objected to the draft proposals as they affected their town and suggested an alternative arrangement which affected three divisions. A private individual forwarded three alternative names for the Brampton division.

(e) Peterborough

The County Council supported the majority of the divisions in the draft proposals but submitted an alternative scheme for the Orton Longueville, Orton Waterville, Peterborough West, Ravensthorpe and South Bretton divisions. They considered that the joint projected electorate for the two Orton parishes justified two County divisions, even allowing for recent slippage in the New Town building programme. They said that the joint projected electorate shown in their draft scheme would be achieved but not now until well after 1986. The County Council submitted a revised projected 1986 electorate for the Ortons which they considered equal to two average county divisions. They recommended that either the existing Orton parish boundaries be accepted as the divisional boundaries or an area be transferred from the Orton Longueville parish to the Orton Waterville parish to achieve a better electoral balance. As a consequence of the changes to the Orton Longuevills and Orton Waterville divisions the County Council found it necessary to rearrange the West and Ravensthorpe district wards into three equal divisions. Cambridgeshire County Labour Party supported the draft proposals and objected to the County Council's alternative scheme for five divisions. They considered that the shift of the county electoral boundary between Orton Waterville and Orton Longueville would only confuse the population. They also considered that it was invidious to start using amended projections to justify a case for new divisions unless amended figures were used for the whole of the City, since any scaling down might have implications elsewhere. Orton Longueville Parish Council objected to the draft proposals and considered that the Ortons should be represented by two councillors. Newborough Parish Council objected to the draft proposals as they affected their parish.

(f) South Cambridgeshire

The County Council and Over Parish Council supported the draft proposals. Cambridgeshire County Labour Party supported the draft proposals except that they suggested that the whole of the Coton ward be included in the Girton division rather than be split between the Girton and Comberton divisions. South Cambridgeshire District Council objected to the draft proposals and submitted an alternative scheme for six divisions. Willingham Parish Council objected to the draft proposals as they affected their parish and suggested an alternative arrangement. Duxford Parish Council objected to being included in a division with Harston on the grounds that this would make the division very unwieldy. They also proposed that the division should be named Duxford. Gamlingay Parish Council objected to the draft proposals as they affected their parish.

9. In reassessing our draft proposals we noted that there was considerable opposition to those for East Cambridgeshire District: the County Council, and several other organisations and private individuals suggested that the proposals undermined established community links and interests and brought together parishes with no natural or community associations. We accepted that there could possibly be acute geographical difficulties in the area. However, we were concerned about the resulting deterioration in numerical standards of the divisions in the County Council's alternative scheme compared with the draft proposals. We have generally taken the view that in electoral reviews the overriding consideration must be the question of numerical balance between divisions and although community ties have to be taken into account, they cannot override equality of representation unless there are the most cogent reasons. In view of the strength of feeling about local ties we invited the County Council to provide more information about the difficulties in this district to which they attached such great importance.

10. The County Council replied that historically the district divided into two, the southern boundary of the City of Ely and the Middle Fen/River Cam being the boundary between the former administrative counties of Cambridgeshire and the Isle of Ely and they considered that the communities are still linked in this way. They stated that to be acceptable locally, any scheme should recognise this and deal with each part separately. They explained that their county pioneered the concept of village colleges which act as a focal point for the rural area and are recognised as a community centre for social, sporting, recreational and educational purposes. They considered these catchment areas to be very significant. They also mentioned that communications in this part of the county were difficult but considered these were fundamental in creating a viable division which could be reasonably serviced by an elected member. The County Council stated that they were anxious to achieve a scheme which provided a balanced electorate and retained the community links as far as practicable. They suggested that we should consider an amalgam of their draft scheme and their alternative scheme submitted in response to the draft proposals. This solution was based on the Littleport, Ely West, Ely North and South and Sutton divisions from their draft scheme and the Soham, Woddditton and Burwell divisions from their alternative scheme.

11. We have come to the following conclusions taking into consideration all the comments that were submitted to us:

(a) Cambridge City

There have been no objections to our draft proposals and we have therefore decided to adhere to these for the district.

(b) East Cambridgeshire

The County Council's latest suggestion produced overall an improved standard of representation compared with their earlier alternative but was still inferior to

the draft proposals. Before considering it however we confirmed that those bodies likely to be particularly interested in it, namely the Labour Party and the Liberal Association had received a copy and had had an opportunity to comment on it. We were aware of the considerable opposition to our draft proposals on the grounds that they broke local ties and brought together parishes which had no natural or community associations. As stated above we do take into account community ties but we have generally taken the view that these cannot override equality of representation unless there are the most cogent reasons. We have considered the arguments presented by the County Council and concluded that in the absence of any adverse comment and in view of the fact these are exceptional geographical difficulties in the area we should adopt their latest suggestion.

(c) Fenland

The alternative scheme for the Elm, North Witchford and Whittlesey Rural and Whittlesey divisions put forward by the County Council and Fenland District Council produces approximately the same standard of representation as our draft proposals but does not appear to offer any advantage over them and we have decided not to adopt it. We did not adopt the suggestion by Wimblington Parish Council that they be linked with either Chatteris or March which would have resulted in the Elm division being over-represented. The alternative scheme affecting the same three divisions suggested by Doddington Parish Council produces a superior electoral balance to that of our draft proposals. We have concluded that we should adopt this scheme. We have otherwise decided to adhere to our draft proposals.

(d) Huntingdon

Having considered the arguments put forward by Huntingdon District Council we have decided to change the names of the St Ives and Warboys divisions to St Ives South and St Ives North and Warboys respectively. The alternative scheme for St Ives put forward by Town Councillor M Plews produces an electoral balance slightly inferior to that of our draft proposals and we do not consider that there are sufficiently compelling reasons to warrant the adoption of this scheme. The same considerations apply to the re-arrangement of three divisions in the St Neots area suggested by St Neots Town Council. We have decided not to adopt any of the alternative names for the Brampton division in view of the lack of support for them. Apart from the change of names

suggested by Huntingdon District Council we have adhered to our draft proposals.

(e) Peterborough

The alternative scheme for five divisions suggested by the County Council would result in the Orton Longueville division being somewhat oversized. We have considered the County Council's arguments but we are not satisfied that they constitute sufficient reason to accept their scheme. We have therefore concluded that we should adhere to our draft proposals for this district.

(f) South Cambridgeshire

The alternative scheme for six divisions suggested by South Cambridgeshire District Council would produce an inferior standard of representation compared with our draft proposals and we decided not to accept it. We have decided to accept Cambridgeshire County Labour Party's suggestion that the whole of the Coton ward be included in the Girton division since it would improve the electoral balance between the Girton and Comberton divisions. We do not consider that a case has been made out for any other changes for the district.

12. We accordingly confirm our draft proposals as our final proposals for all districts in the county subject to the adoption of the latest alternative scheme suggested by the County Council for East Cambridgeshire District (para 11(b)); the alternative scheme for three divisions in Fenland District (para 11 (c)); the changes of name in Huntingdon District (para 11 (d)) and the alternative arrangement of two divisions in South Cambridgeshire District referred to in paragraph 11 (f).

13. Details of these final proposals are set out in Schedules 1 and 2 to this report and on the attached map. Schedule 1 gives the names of the electoral divisions. A detailed description of the boundaries of the proposed divisions as defined on the map is set out in Schedule 2.

PUBLICATION

14. In accordance with section 60(3) of the Local Government Act 1972 a copy of this

report and the map are being sent to Cambridgeshire County Council and will be available for inspection at the Council's main offices. Copies of the report (without map) are being sent to those who received the consultation letter and to those who made comments.
