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## **Summary**

The session has two parts:

• 30-minute science theatre show – pupils participate in an interactive science theatre show exploring numeracy, the use of money, including exchanging currency, map co-ordinates, and time zones and the 24 hour clock. At the end of the show, pupils are asked to identify the key words used in the show.



30 minutes exploring the exhibition –
pupils are challenged to investigate the exhibition and identify items within it that
demonstrate the key words used in the first part of the show. Teachers are given
cameras to take photos of the pupils' investigations.

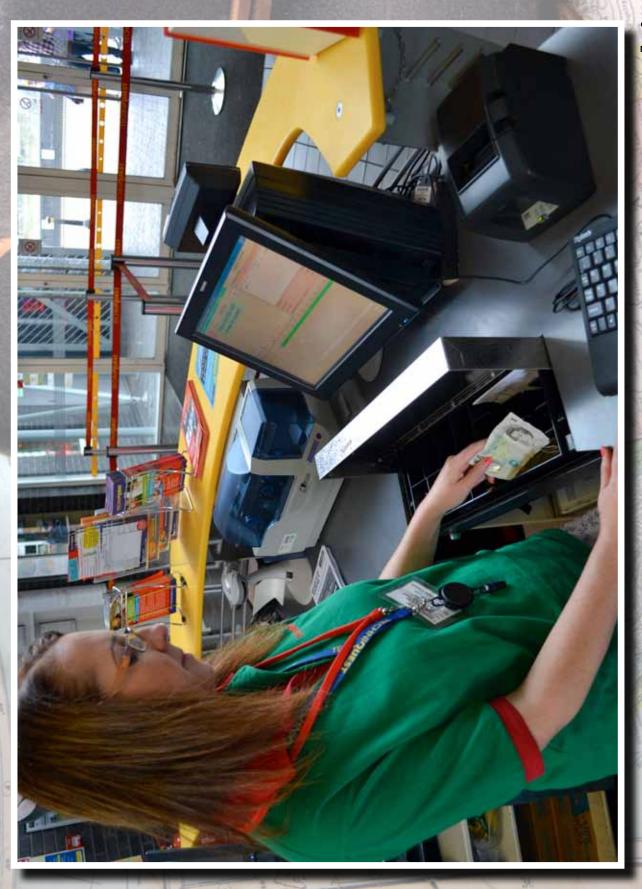




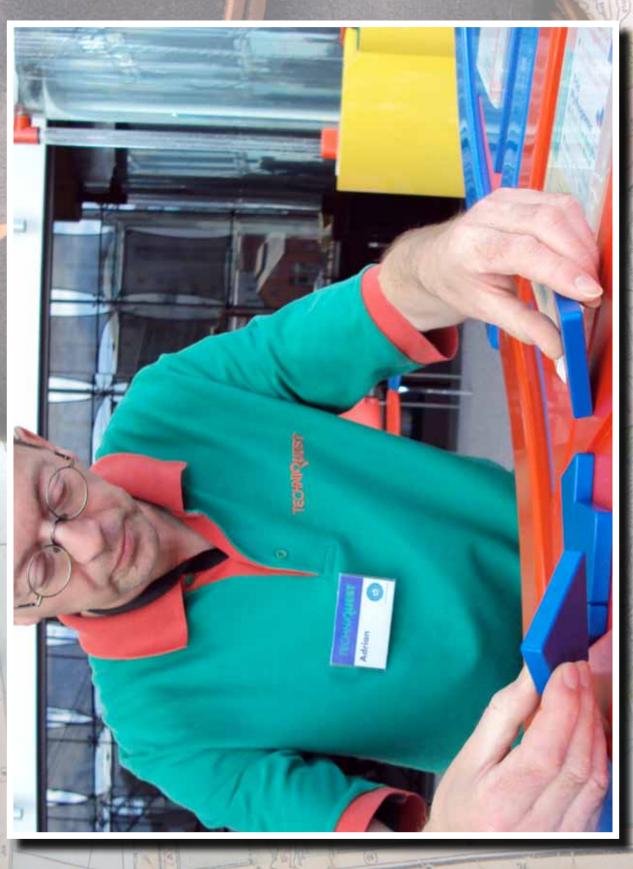
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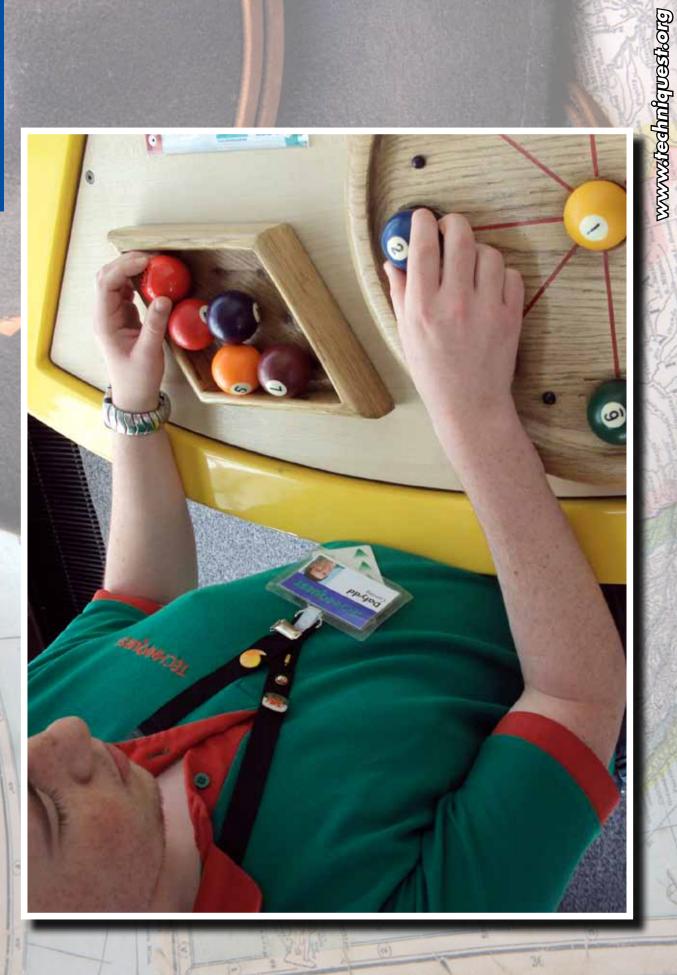


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# Anthony with 'Towers of Brahma':

 Shapes - the puzzle requires the discs being moved from one tower to another. Larger discs cannot be placed on top of smaller ones.

#### Liane with the café menu:

- Numbers the ice creams cost different amounts.
- Money the café tariff shows the prices in £ and p.

## Paul with 'Turning Trains':

- Shapes the turntable is used to change the positions of the carriages.
- Number patterns and sequences
   all of the train carriages need to be in the correct number order.

## Daf with 'Unlucky Seven':

 Shapes - the tangram pieces must be arranged to fit into different shapes.

## Liane at the till:

 Money - Liane takes the money from the visitors and gives them change from the till.

# Adrian with 'Pythagoras Puzzle':

 Shapes - the individual pieces from the smaller squares fit into the larger square.



## **Gruff with 'Pitch Perfect':**

- Measurements the speed is displayed in miles per hour.
- Numbers the speed is displayed as a digital number.

### Anna with 'Heave Ho':

 Measurements - the bags have their weights written on them in kg.

# Calli with 'Wiggly Wire':

 Numbers - the display shows the number of times the metal hoop has touched the wire.

### Daf with 'It All Adds UP':

- Numbers each ball has a different number on it.

 Shapes - the different pieces are fitted together to make the shape of a pyramid.

# **Challenge**

School Treasure Map
Can you create a maths trail in and around your school? Find a starting place and write a set of instructions for others to follow. Tell them how many paces to move e.g 'start at the door of the classroom and walk 10 paces to your left'.

You could hide an object for them to find so it becomes a treasure hunt.





### **Gather/Organise**

This is the starting point for the activity. Pupils assimilate all their knowledge about the topic into their working memory. At this stage it is possible to identify what pupils already know and any gaps in their knowledge. It is also possible to begin differentiating between pupils.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- What do you know about this?
- Where have you met this before?
- What information do you have?
- How much do you understand?
- What questions do you need to ask?

### **Identify**

Pupils explore their understanding of the task to make sure they know what is required of them. Pupils can also set the success criteria for the activity at this stage.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- What is the task?
- What are your goals?
- What are your obstacles?
- What do you need to know?
- What do you need to do this?

#### Generate

This is a creative and open-ended stage. Pupils may engage in brainstorming. Here all ideas about how to approach the task are valid.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- How many ideas can you find?
- Who can help you?
- Where can you find out more?
- What do other people think?
- Is there another way?

#### Decide

This is a logical, rational, left-brained process, in contrast to the previous stage. Pupils consider time constraints, available resources, health and safety, as well as whether the idea fulfils the brief, when making decisions.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- Which ideas are important?
- Which is the best idea?
- What will happen if...?
- What is your plan?
- What else do you need to do?

#### **Implement**

Pupils test their idea in an attempt to fulfil the criteria for the task. Teamwork is key to their success at this stage. Pupils may work to a structured plan. The focus for this stage is 'maximum thinking, minimum recording'. This stage is all about developing thinking.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- How do you do it?
- How do you check your progress?
- Are you doing it correctly?
- Is your plan working?
- What do you do next?

#### **Evaluate**

Pupils should be realistic about their achievements and identify the next steps for improvement. Self and peer evaluation are key elements of this process.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- What have you done?
- How well did you do?
- How could you do better?
- Did you solve the problem?
- Did you work well in your group?



#### **Communicate**

Pupils present their findings to an audience; this could be within the class, the school or beyond. This stage can increase the pupils' motivation and engagement.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- Who will you tell?
- How will you tell or present?
- What will you say?
- How will you explain?
- How will you interest others?

### **Learn from Experience**

This final stage focuses on metacognition; this is 'thinking about thinking'. In this stage pupils reflect on and discuss their learning. This stage can significantly enhance the impact of the learning experiences.

Questions to ask pupils at this stage include:

- What have you learned?
- How have you changed?
- What do you think and feel now?
- How can you use what you have learnt?
- How would you use this again?



## **Concept Photos**

These 'concept photos' have been developed to promote discussion and to stimulate scientific thinking. They show different people discussing an everyday situation and presenting alternative explanations for what can be observed. Because of this, they are a good tool for demonstrating real life applications of science. Each concept photo shows one of Techniquest's exhibits or an everyday situation linked to the science-based topic. Open questions can be used to stimulate thinking and discussion. All pupils' ideas and points of view should be treated equally.

# Developing your own images

To do this:

- Use everyday contexts that pupils are familiar with.
- Provide three or four alternative statements for discussion.
- Use positive rather than negative statements.
- Refer to research on common pupil misconceptions for guidance on statements.
- Include the scientifically acceptable viewpoint.

#### Photo 1

The following questions can be used:

- Do you agree with any of the people in the picture? Who? Why?
- Do you disagree with any of the people in the picture? Who? Why?
- Can you think of any other explanations that are not included here?
- How can we find out which point of view is the most suitable?
- Is it possible that more than one point of view is suitable here?
- Why do you think different pupils have different points of view?

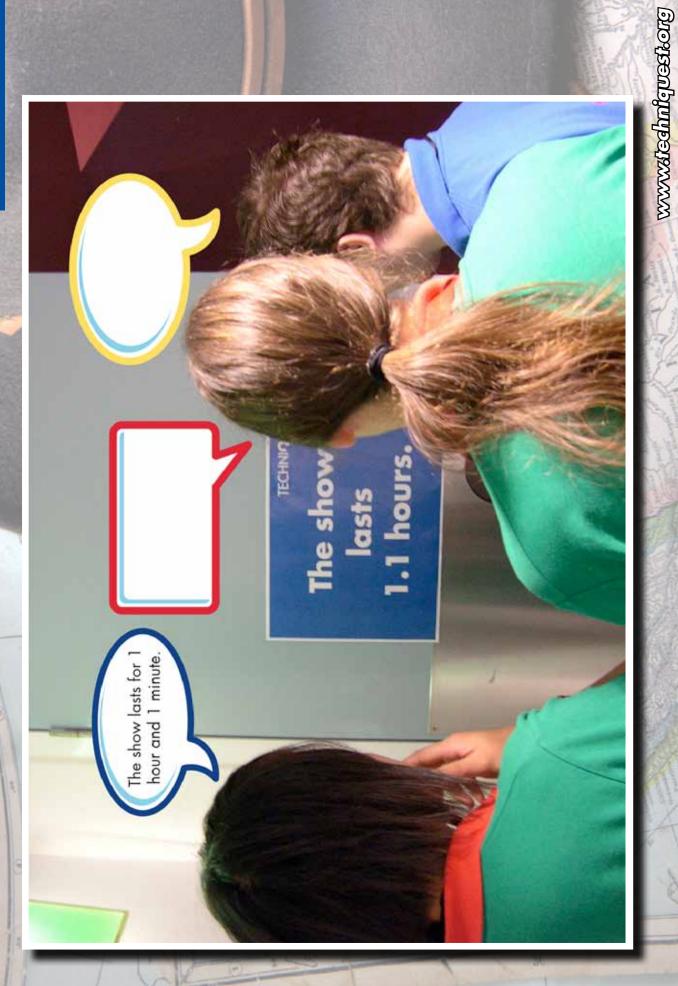
## Photo 2

For this activity, only one of the speech bubbles has been filled in. The following open questions can be used:

- Do you agree or disagree with this statement? Why?
- Can you think of any other explanations that are not included here? These should be filled in on the image.
- Now we have some explanations, which do you agree or disagree with? Why?
- Is it possible that more than one point of view is suitable here?

# Skills Solve mathematical problems

Pupils are given opportunities to:

- Select and use the appropriate mathematics, materials, units of measure and resources to solve problems in a variety of contexts.
- Develop their own mathematical strategies and ideas and consider those of others.

- Use their prior knowledge to find mathematical facts that they have not learned, and to solve numerical problems.
- Estimate solutions to calculations; use
- alternative strategies to check the accuracy of answers.
- Appreciate the continuous nature of measures, and that measurement is approximate; estimate measures, and measure to an appropriate degree of accuracy in a range of contexts.

#### **Communicate mathematically**

Pupils are given opportunities to:

- Use correct mathematical language, notation, symbols and conventions to talk about or to represent their work to others.
- Recognise, and generalise in words, patterns that arise in numerical, spatial or practical situations.
- Visualise and describe shapes, movements and transformations.
- Explain strategies, methods, choices and conclusions to others in a variety of ways – verbally, graphically, using informal written methods.

#### Reason mathematically

Pupils are given opportunities to:

- Check results and interpret solutions to calculations, including calculator displays; check against the context of the problem that solutions are reasonable.
- Develop early ideas of algebra and mathematical structure by exploring number sequences and relationships; explain and predict subsequent terms.
