Ramadan and your health

Ramadan is one of the holiest months in the Islamic calendar. It requires **healthy** adults to fast between sunrise and sunset. This means taking nothing by mouth during day light hours. In the UK, this year Ramadan will begin on the evening of Sunday 5 May and end on Tuesday 4 June.

Fasting is required for healthy adults but some people are exempt if fasting is considered to have a bad effect on their health.

"God desires ease for you: He does not want to put you into difficulties" (2:185).

Exemptions are made for:

- Young children (under the age of puberty).
- The sick
- People with mental health problems
- The elderly
- Women who are menstruating, pregnant, or breast-feeding
- If you consider the fast is having a detrimental effect on health or life threatening
- If you are compelled to break the fast or if your illness is temporary you can fast later in the year
- If you are too unwell to observe the fast the priority is given to your health and wellbeing.

What if I want to fast?

Just like physical health problems, people with mental health problems can become unwell if they don't or can't take medication properly.

Allah says in the Quran: "Whoever obeys God and His Messenger, stands in awe of God, and keeps his duty to Him will be triumphant. (24:52)" 2

So by not fasting when you are sick is still worshiping Allah because you are obeying His commandments and the command of the Prophet. If you are unwell enough to take medication but well enough to decide to fast, then you should consult your doctor, local imam, Sheikh, or Muslim Chaplain about your decision. Failing to do so is contrary to the Qur'an, which clearly states that you must not act in a way that harms your body. **Stopping smoking** can be a problem if you stop completely as it can increase the amount of some drugs such as clozapine in your blood. If you just stop smoking between sunset and dawn it may not be a problem, but if you stop completely you must seek expert advice and you may need to have your dosage adjusted.
