

A report of the Parochial Church Council Meeting

held on Monday, 17th June 2019 in Duffield Church



This meeting of the Council took place with the Vicar, the Revd Dr James Hughes in the Chair, and 14 other members present. The first meeting of the new Council after the Annual Church Meeting began with a service of Holy Communion. The Vicar then opened the meeting by welcoming new members—Anna Maddison and Mike Severn, returning members—Andrew Jackson and Tom Gray, and a member with a new role—Paul Linford, now Churchwarden.

New Officers for the coming year were appointed:

Vice-Chair Richard Lindop, Hon Treasurer Nick Peacock, Hon PCC Secretary Marion Taulbut.

The role of the Standing Committee was discussed and it was confirmed that the Standing Committee has delegated authority from the PCC to spend up to £500 where appropriate.

Safeguarding

- In addition to the safeguarding@stalkmundsduffield.co.uk email address for people to report safeguarding concerns, a new mobile phone number has now been set up 07486 560657.
- Since the last PCC meeting, DBS certificates have been obtained for 11 church members who were recommended to the PCC for appointment. This was agreed unanimously. There are now 69 members of the congregation with valid certificates and a further five in progress.

The Revd David Barnsley has been invited to take up a secondment to St Peter's Stapenhill. This has come about through the suggestion of Bishop Rod Thomas, Stapenhill's episcopal visitor, with the active help of the Derby Diocese and the cooperation of James Hughes, Vicar of the United Benefice.

From September 2019, and for an initial six months, David Barnsley will spend Sunday mornings and two other days a week there. This will bring about a transition in terms of David's work, bringing forward a change which was anticipated could happen in September 2020.

David will return to Little Eaton on Sunday afternoons to lead the planned 4.30pm services there.

From the start of September there will no longer be 10am services at St Paul's; and 8am Communion services will only be held at the Cemetery All Saints' Chapel in Duffield on 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays.

Come and See-Mini Mission-Love, Happiness, Hope and Life

This is to take place from **Monday 16th to Sunday 22nd September**, led by David Barnsley.

This will be at both churches. The idea is to use existing patterns and to expand them through invitation, social media and PRAYER with expectation.

The conclusion of the week will see Meals and Guest Services at both churches, and with a special focus on Testimony and encouraging people to come to church on Sundays, and the 'Essentials' course starting at Little Eaton in October...

There is to be a new **pattern of PCC meetings**. There will be three each for St Alkmund's and St Paul's separately, and three joint meetings during the year. This is not 'set in stone'—there may be revisions. The next meeting of the Church Council will be joint and take place on Monday 15th July.

Any matters for discussion should be with the Chairman 14 days beforehand.
