

Saad Qureshi: Something About Paradise Yorkshire Sculpture Park, Wakefield The Bretton estate's beautiful

sandstone, light-filled, Palladian chapel has since its restoration in cnapei nas since its restoration in 2013 formed a stunning gallery at YSP for intimate, spiritually charged work — Ai Weiwei's trees, Chiharu Shiota's filigree threads. It is an ideal site for 2020's inaugural exhibition, the first solo museum show for 33-year-old Pakistan-born British sculbtor Oureshi, whose poetic. sculptor Qureshi, whose poetic, fantastical architectural models are infused with ideas about faith, fusion of cultures, belonging. "The Gates of Paradise" are seven huge hand-cut painted wooden gates, their ornamentation echoing Arabic, art nouveau, geometric styles. A five-metre ladder teeters to the ceiling, its rungs ever smaller: a dream of infinity. "Night Jewel" is a glass fibre and resin moon studded with an elegant columnar building, sei-fi meeting classision. infused with ideas about faith, fusion

Constructed from wood, steel, Celotex and sand, the three pieces comprising the new titular work "Something About Paradise" are monumental, tilting, unstable, enchanting structures. One is a nile enchanting structures. One is a pile of towers and spires, the others organic landscapes, strange geological formations, by turns smooth and crumbling, depicting mountains,



deserts, forests, waterfalls, cataclysms, and spread with fragmented minuscule buildings: churches, temples, palaces, modernist houses plus little doors and windows across the surfaces, suggesting secret gardens, wonderlands, paradises of the imagination. The Tower of Babel,

post-apocalyptic ruin, torrential Chinese scroll painting, and Eliot's metaphor for regret "the passage we did not take/Towards the door we never opened/Into the rose garden", all come to mind; the pleasure of play, games of scale, folly, utopias, time, stillness, are themes. "Quranic allegories of the seven heavens formed part of the backdrop to family life," says Qureshi; he is interested in evoking the different "paradises that others spoke of . . . never too far from our ysp.org.uk, to March 15

Emily Young Bowman Sculpture, London Near her Tuscan home, Young has turned environmental activist. environmental activist, carving the enormous face of Cautha, the Etruscan dawn goddess, on a rock above the Zancona river in protest against a new power station. Young's majestic work gains ever more resonance in the climate change era; her climate change era: her carved heads, compelling, individual, ravishing in their individual, ravishing in their complex huse – luminous onyx "Blue Sea Head", green patinated bronze "Wind Head", golden "Honey Crystal Quartzite Head" – take power from their rugged, unfinished rugged, unfinished appearance, as if the stone speaks alongside the artist's hand and chisel, suggesting the vast reach of earth's history, connecting natural and human, past and present.
