

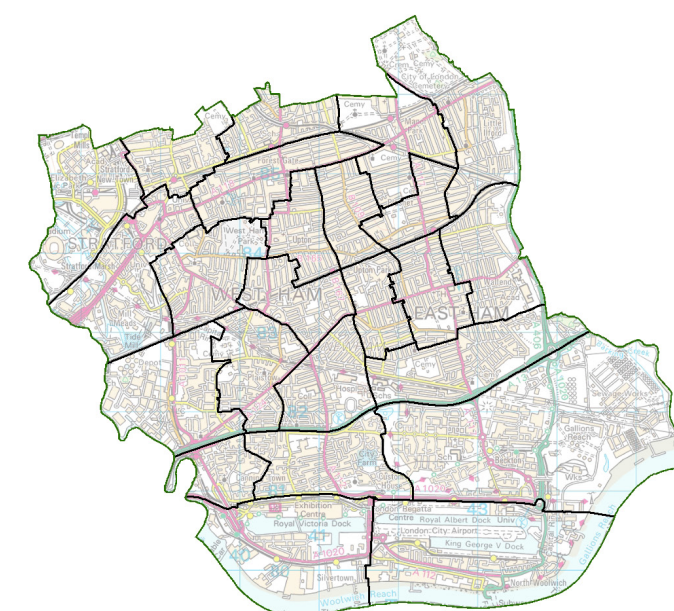
Our Recommendations

The table lists all the wards we are proposing as part of our final recommendations along with the number of voters in each ward. The table also shows the electoral variances for each of the proposed wards which tells you how we have delivered electoral equality. Finally, the table includes electorate projections for 2025 so you can see the impact of the recommendations for the future.

Who we are

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament.
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons.
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

Electoral review

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's voters ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

Why Newham?

- The Commission has a legal duty to carry out an electoral review of each council in England 'from time to time'.
- Newham Council has not been reviewed since 1999 and the Commission has therefore decided that it should review Newham in advance of the elections in 2022.
- Newham currently has high levels of electoral inequality: some councillors represent many more or many fewer voters than others.

Our proposals

- Newham Council currently has 60 councillors. Based on the evidence we received, we recommend that 66 councillors should serve the council in the future.
- We believe our final recommendations meet our statutory criteria to:
 1. Deliver electoral equality for voters
 2. Reflect community interests and identities
 3. Promote effective and convenient local government

Summary of our recommendations

Our final recommendations propose that Newham Council should have 66 councillors, six more than the current arrangements.

We are recommending that there should be 18 three-councillor and six two-councillor wards across the council area. The boundaries of most wards will change, only West Ham will stay the same.

In response to feedback on our draft recommendations and further draft recommendations, we have amended some of our proposals. For example, Maryland ward will be represented by two-councillors and not three as we originally proposed, and we modified its boundaries with the neighbouring wards of Forest Gate North, Forest Gate South and Stratford. We have also modified the boundaries of Manor Park ward in response to the representations we received and made minor modifications to the boundaries between Boleyn and East Ham South wards as well as Royal Albert and Royal Victoria wards.

We made changes to the names of four wards following comments on our earlier recommendations.

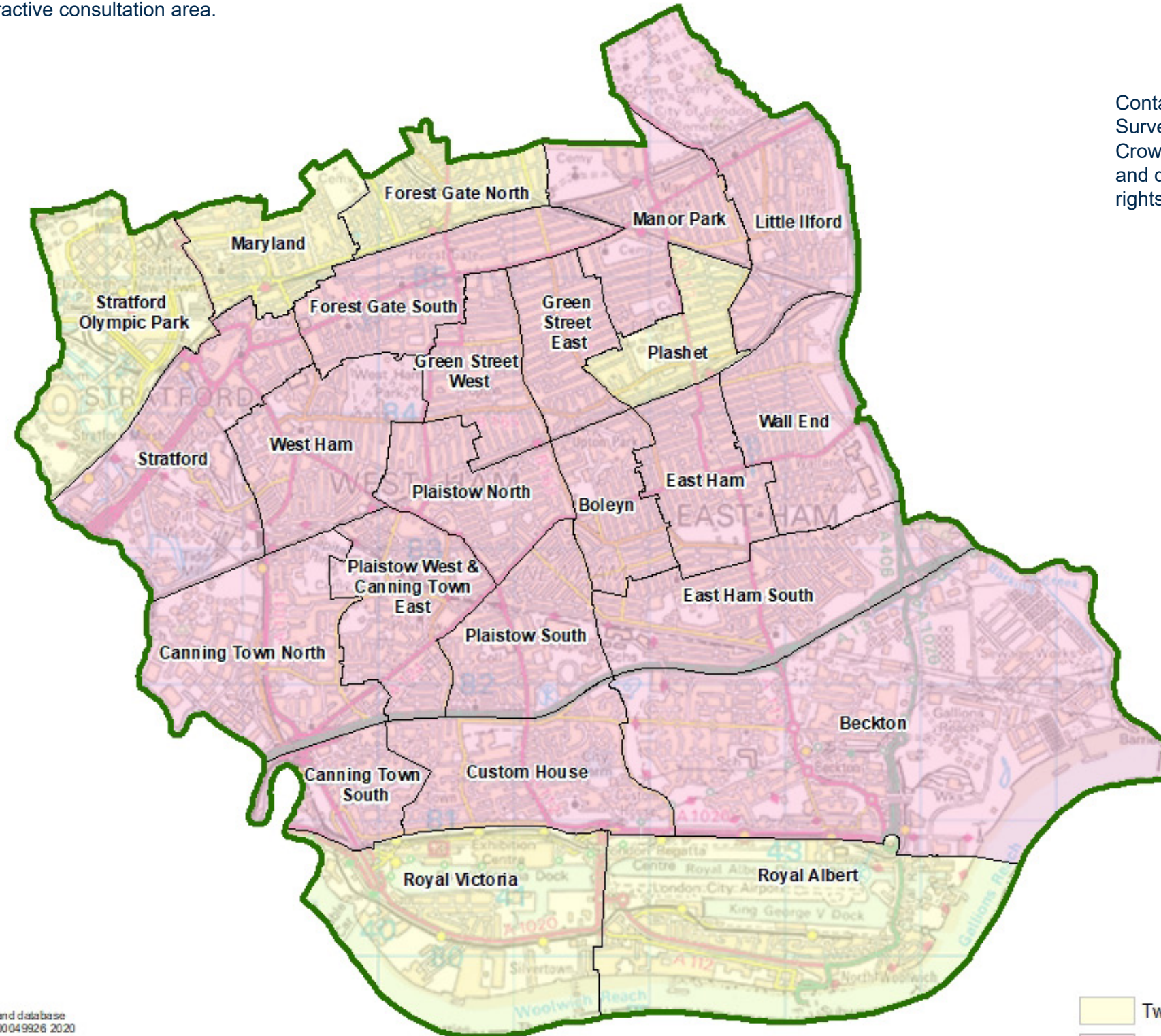
Stage of Review	Description
04 June 2019 - 12 August 2020	Public consultation on warding arrangements
29 October 2019 - 17 February 2020	Public consultation on draft recommendations
03 March 2020 - 14 April 2020	Extended public consultation on draft recommendations
01 September 2020 - 12 October 2020	Public consultation on further limited draft recommendations
17 November 2020	Publication of final recommendations
May 2022	Subject to parliamentary approval - implementation of new arrangements at local elections
